Après une première édition réussie, voici le deuxième numéro du journal de l'école.

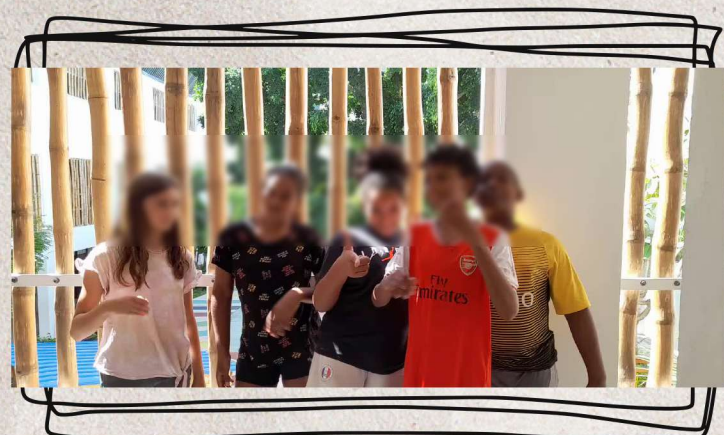

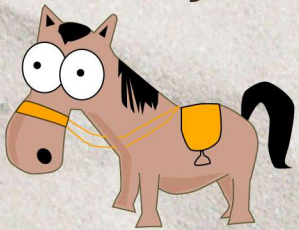

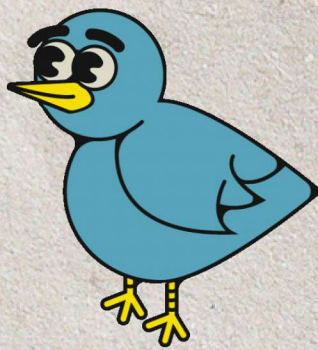
TANZANIA DEFORESTATION CRISIS

It is on the third Monday of January, this year it was on 16th January.

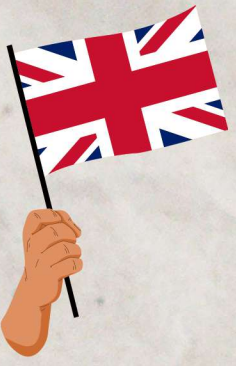
Said to be the most depressing day of the year, looking at the faces at school that day, it certainly seems to be true.

Digital Arts



Two famous British artists use new technologies in their art.

David Hockney has been using his tablet and Photoshop software as early as 1986.

In his “Currency Project” Damien Hirst has sold for a relatively cheap amount (\$2000) a limited addition of painting on paper, also available with its NFT digital online copy. After 6 years, the owner had to **choose between keeping the painted paper artwork or retaining the NFT copy. All remaining paper versions were then burnt.**

No doubt this will increase the price of what is left.

Zanzibar Revolution Day

Around 3:00 am on 12 January 1964, 600–800 poorly armed, mainly African insurgents attacked Unguja's police stations to seize weapons, and then the radio station, having only the advantage of number and surprise.

By 3 February, Zanzibar was finally returning to normality, and Abeid Amani Karume was chosen as the president.

Their independence was obtained from England on December 12, 1962 and one month later they declared January 12 as a National Holiday.

VALENTINE'S DAY: A VERY BRITISH TRADITION



History has it that Valentine was a priest near Rome in the year 270, a time when the Christian church was subjected to significant persecution.

King Henry VIII of England is the one who created St Valentine's day as a holiday in the 1500s.

During the medieval period, a popular folk belief held that birds selected their mates in February. On Valentine's Day in England, young men selected their Valentines by drawing lots, and the young woman chosen would remain a man's Valentine through the ensuing year.

In 1840, the British Parliament instituted mail delivery throughout England at a flat rate of a penny, and the expense of mailing a letter could be prepaid using a new device—the postage stamp.

It is around this time, during the Victorian period, that many people stated sending anonymous cards through the post, sometimes with unromantic, nasty content.

Today, this tradition of giving an anonymous card to your beloved is a common practice in the United-Kingdom.
